# Stage 3: Sequence of Lessons

#### Lesson 1

### Supplies and Resources Needed:

• 9X12 white paper, pencil, black fine tip marker, large color markers

### Detail of lesson procedures:

Introduce the American illustrator, David Sibley. Show video Artist David Sibley: For the birds. Ask the students to think about how did the artist David Sibley learn how to draw so many birds? Ask how did he choose the colors he used to illustrate his birds? Explain in this project the students are going to learn how to draw a simple drawing of an owl and they are going to use all the primary and secondary colors that they have been learning about to color in their drawing with markers. Demonstrate how to draw an owl and have the students follow along in pencil. Then have them go over the pencil in a black fine tip marker.



### Lesson 2

### Supplies and Resources Needed:

 9X12 white paper, pencil, black fine tip marker, large color markers

### Detail of lesson procedures:

Review the primary and secondary colors. Show the video *Maya's Guide* for *Bird Watching for Kids and Parents*. Review about how David Sibley used colors in his illustrations that he observed from nature. Explain in their owl drawings the students should use imaginary colors for their owls. Students are to color their owls.

<u>primary color</u> – red, yellow, blue <u>secondary color</u> – green, orange, violet
